

Welcome to the Final RegHealth-RI Newsletter

The European Regions' Network for Health Research and Innovation (RegHealth-RI) is a two-year European project that was finalised in early November 2016.

RegHealth-RI aims to bridge the gap in Research and Innovation (R&I) across European regions, focusing on the health area, by analysing the present situation, identifying common patterns and drivers of differences, proposing new initiatives to reduce differences in R&I performance, and building synergies between Structural Funds and Horizon 2020.

PROJECT NEWS

RegHealth-RI Final Conference in Brussels

On 20 October, after two years of implementation, the European Regions' Network for Health Research and Innovation (RegHealth-RI), celebrated its Final Conference "Bridging the Divide in European Health Research and Innovation" in Brussels. The conference was co-hosted by the Embassy of the Republic of Poland in Brussels and the Permanent Representation of the Republic of Poland to the EU.



During the conference, the findings of the RegHealth-RI project were presented, including the outcomes of the three international workshops, the updated and improved version of the report "State of the Art of Health Research and Innovation (R&I) in EU regions" and a set of policy recommendations building on the project's results. The event gathered 80 attendees, including project partners, high level representatives and key stakeholders working in the fields of health, research, innovation, and regional development to discuss the gaps in health R&I across Europe.

The main results presented were the following:

- Most significant factors hindering participation in Horizon2020 of EU lessperforming regions/countries:
 - Extremely populated scientific field generating a high competition to get funding.
 - o Discouragement coming from low success rate.
 - Lack of expertise to prepare consistent proposals.
 - Large and complex topics more suited for the participation of reputed organizations from elite EU regions.
 - Lack of specific support to prepare the proposals.
 - Low expected reward in relation to the effort for preparing and implementing the projects/proposals.

Negative factors hindering health research and innovation progress of in EU less-performing countries/regions:

- o Brain drain in the field of health research in a region/country.
- Low understanding of specific research and innovation issues by policy and decision makers.
- o Insufficient knowledge transfer from public research organizations to interested stakeholders.
- o Poor investment in public research and, above all, in private research.
- Insufficient linkages with excellent organizations, companies, etc., from advanced and leading European regions and countries (international collaboration).

• Factors hindering synergies between Horizon2020 and European Structural and Investment Funds:

- The very high difficulty in obtaining H2020 funding from EU less performing regions institutions (Public Research Centres, Universities, Hospitals, Industry, etc.) is probably the main trouble for reaching such synergies. It seems obvious that without H2020 funding there is not possibility of synergies.
- Significant conceptual and strategic differences between H2020 (excellent research) and ESIF (regional capacity building and overcome structural difference) make those synergies also difficult to achieve.
- There are also important organizational and administrative differences between H2020 and ESIF in terms of timing, different cost definitions and financial management rules, etc., which makes synergies a rather complicated business.

The Massive Open Online Course (MOOC) on EU funding

The European Committee of the Regions in Brussels launches its 2nd MOOC for regional and local practitioners. This year's topic is the EU budget: How does it work? How to access funding? What is the difference between EFSI and ESI Funds, what are the MFF and H2020?

European Union invests €45 million into research to combat the Zika disease

The EU is investing €45 million in research to combat the emerging infections transmitted by mosquitoes, especially the outbreak of the Zika virus disease. The funding from Horizon 2020 and the EU's research and innovation programme will support research on treatments, diagnostics and vaccines, as well as better risk

assessment for Zika.

Carlos Moedas, European Commissioner for Research, Science and Innovation, said: "This research is an example of how we can mobilise funding quickly to face major new threats, and how we can lead a major research effort on a global scale."

The funding is mainly distributed among the three consortia: ZikaPLAN (€11 million), coordinated by the Umeå University in Sweden, ZIKAction (€7 million), coordinated by the PENTA Foundation in Italy, and ZikAlliance (€12 million), coordinated by INSERM in France.


The researchers will aim to set up a Latin Americana and Caribbean network for emerging infectious diseases preparedness and response. The involvement of local researchers is an absolute necessity and reflects participation of Brazilian researchers reflects the need for international effort to combat these infections.

European Commission to invest € 9.1 million in 189 innovative businesses

189 small and medium-sized enterprises (SMEs) from 24 countries have been selected for funding in the latest round of the Horizon2020 SME Instrument.

The funding is provided under Phase 1 of the instrument, resulting in € 50,000 per project to finance feasibility studies for innovative products that can create a new market.



34 SMEs from Italy were accepted for funding; this number was the highest among the countries. Italy was followed by Spanish firms (30) and SMEs from the United Kingdom (18). Most of the projects selected will be in ICT (29), followed by transport and low-carbon energy systems (both 24).

The Executive Agency for SMEs, EASME, this year received 1,938 project proposals from 40 countries during the third cut-off of the SME Instrument Phase 1. Under this programme, launched in January 2014, 1840 SMEs have been selected for funding.

The next cut-off for Phase 1 is 9 November 2016.
